The purpose of this study was to determine if utilizing a four square vocabulary box when presented with difficult science text would improve student reading comprehension. Three high school students who receive

special education services participated in the eight week study. Participants received explicit instruction from the author on how to use a four square vocabulary box when reading expository text. In addition, participants were presented with an overview of lesson objectives, background knowledge was introduced, comprehension of text was assessed, and vocabulary was reviewed. Pretest and posttests were given to indicate if the use of a four square vocabulary box would increase student reading comprehension. Results indicated student reading levels did not increase. This study raises the question about ways to instruct students with disabilities on how to understand difficult vocabulary found in expository text and if more practice time is needed for students to improve reading comprehension. Such information is universally defective and together with assumptions imposed guides the development of paradigms with their laws of thought, logic of reasoning, mathematics and computational

techniques. The relational structure is seen in terms of logical trinity with a given example as matter-information-energy transformational trinity which is supported by the time trinity of past-present-future relationality. The purpose of this project was to determine if there was a correlation between homework completion rate on the Four-Square

Vocabulary Flashcards and quiz scores. The researcher took 8th grade students' quiz scores pre- and post-intervention (use of flash cards), compared it to homework completion rates and students' ability level. After a review of the data, the author concluded that Four-Square method might only have been helpful for students who met or partially met grade level expectations, and were likely to have been ineffective for students who did not meet grade expectations.
