As war consumes Europe and threatens to cross the narrow channel into Britain, children are sent into the hinterlands for their safety. Among these are seven brothers and sisters from Southampton who find themselves on a country estate owned by an old widower. Here in the woods they come across a cave, and stumbling through it they find themselves in another world. Here they make new friends - and

discover new enemies. War erupts around them, and they find themselves inexorably drawn into a conflict perhaps greater than that they fled in England. The massive armies of seven nations mobilize and begin to converge upon Nesmieria. Gone are the days when the guardians stood watch and titans roamed the west, when spring was young upon the earth - soon, the children of the sun may follow them into oblivion, and summer be turned to winter before it has even fully begun. The seven children of Albert may not be able to defeat their enemies on their own. Drug overdose, driven largely by overdose related to the use of opioids, is now the leading cause of unintentional injury death in the United States. The ongoing opioid crisis lies at the intersection of two public health challenges: reducing the burden of suffering from pain and containing the rising toll of the harms that can arise from the use of opioid medications. Five-star General Dwight D. Eisenhower was arguably the single most important military figure of World War II. *Crusade in Europe* tells the complete story of the war as he planned and executed it. Through Eisenhower's eyes the enormous scope and drama of the war--strategy, battles, moments of great decision--become fully illuminated in all their fateful glory. Penned before his Presidency, this account is deeply human and helped propel him to the highest office. His personal record of the tense first hours after he had issued the order to attack leaves no doubt of his travails and reveals how this great leader handled the ultimate pressure. For historians, his memoir of this world historic period has become an indispensable record of the war and timeless classic. While most critical studies of interwar literary politics have focused on nationalism, Patrick Query makes a case that the idea of Europe intervenes in instances when the individual and the nation negotiate identity. He examines the ways interwar writers use three European ritual forms--verse drama, bullfighting, and Roman Catholic rite--to articulate ideas of European cultural identity. Within the growing discourse of globalization, Query argues, Europe presents a special, though often overlooked, case because it adds a mediating term between local and global. His book is divided into three sections: the first treats the verse dramas of T.S. Eliot, W.B. Yeats, and W.H. Auden; the second discusses the uses of the Spanish bullfight in works by D.H. Lawrence, Stephen Spender, Jack Lindsay, George Barker, Cecil Day Lewis, and others; and the third explores the cross-cultural impact of Catholic ritual in Graham Greene, Evelyn Waugh, and David Jones. While all three ritual forms were frequently associated with the most conservative tendencies of the age, Query shows that each had a remarkable political flexibility in the hands of interwar writers concerned with the idea of Europe. Over the next few years, the United States will be significantly reducing its military forces in Europe from their late-1980s strength of about 300,000 troops. This report considers how far this drawdown should go and how many troops

should be left behind, focusing on the post-1995 period. The author develops four options for sizing the future U.S. presence, each representing a distinct choice in terms of policy, strategy, and capability: Forward Presence, Dual-Based Presence, Limited Presence, and Symbolic Presence. The author finds that a strong case can be made for a posture of forward presence, which alone meets the requirements flowing from all U.S. goals while maintaining flexibility for the future. Militarily, this option provides an operationally coherent force that can conduct major independent combat missions in Europe on short notice. Also, this posture provides a wide range of diverse capabilities for meeting peacetime needs, while fulfilling the broad spectrum of crisis and wartime requirements--small and large--that might arise on a time-urgent basis. Politically, this posture is attractive because it projects a weighty U.S. military presence onto the European continent, thereby reminding all nations that the United States is a European power with vital interests there. This posture would also help maintain NATO's unity under U.S. leadership, reassure allies, and credibly warn potential adversaries. It would contribute to maintaining a military balance of power and encouraging a cooperative security architecture in Europe. Finally, it would help foster the kind of geostrategic stability that encourages progress toward a peaceful and united continent in close partnership with the United States.

David Hume (7 May 1711 to 25 August 1776) was a Scottish philosopher, historian, economist, and essayist, known especially for

his philosophical empiricism and skepticism. He was one of the most important figures in the history of Western philosophy and the Scottish Enlightenment.[In 1754 to 1762 Hume published the History of England, a six-volume work of immense sweep, which extends, says its subtitle, "From the Invasion of Julius Caesar to the Revolution in 1688". Inspired by Voltaire's sense of the breadth of history, Hume widened the focus of history, away from merely Kings, Parliaments, and armies, to literature and science as well. He argued that the quest for liberty was the highest standard for judging the past, and concluded that after considerable fluctuation, England at the time of his writing had achieved "the most entire system of liberty, that was ever known amongst mankind." This fifth volume of the Chronicon Edition covers the reign of King Charles I, the English Civil War, and Oliver Cromwell's Commonwealth. While the Thirty Years War consumes Europe and frees the British Isles from all foreign wars and threats of invasion, religious conflict continues to tear each of the three kingdoms of Great Britain apart. Catholics, Episcopalians, Presbyterians, Puritans, Covenanters, and Independents vie for control of the king, the parliaments, and the minds of the people in spite of the well-meaning but ineffectual policies of King Charles. Hume's exhaustive narrative concerning the disintegration of the English kingdom caused by virulent disputes over the most trivial details of religious practice provides vivid evidence for how this relatively recent experience must have influenced America's founding fathers when they established the principals of tolerance and the separation of church and state -- concepts totally alien to all parties at the time of which he writes. Hume also explores the deepening conflict between king and parliament relative to the powers of imposing taxes, regulating commerce, enforcing laws, ensuring justice, raising armies and fleets, and the many other concerns of a modern state.
